Blueberry Blurb

It was an incredible summer at Camp Oconto and we were so thrilled to be back to in-person camp! Running camp during a pandemic was not how we imagined one of our early summers as directors of Oconto would go... but we are so thrilled with how it all turned out.

To run safely, we had to jump through a lot of hoops and it would not have been possible without the cooperation, dedication and enthusiasm of lots and lots of people. Thank you to the campers/QCs and their parents, the staff/Semis, the Section Heads, the Medical Teams, the Camp Excellence Team (kitchen and maintenance) and the Oconto alumnae for everything you all did to make summer 2021 possible and safe.

So, how did Oconto do it?

Testing before camp: All staff and campers had to be PCR tested 72 hours before arriving at camp and then provide proof of their negative result. When anyone arrived at camp they had to be tested- again (this time with a rapid antigen test). This meant campers could not get out of their car until they received a negative. Parents said good-bye in the parking lot.

Camp Awakening: The camp for girls with physical disabilities at Oconto was not able to run in-person due to COVID-19. Camp Awakening did run virtual programming and we can't wait to welcome them back in-person in summer 2022!

Cohorts: Tads, Chips and QCs were each one cohort. Eagles, Ints and Seniors were divided in two or sometimes three cohorts. While in your cohort, camp could be quite normal. At activities, while with someone from outside of a cohort, we had to practice the "two out of three" rule, meaning we had to be two of three things, outside, six feet apart, and masked. This meant at something like canoeing - outside and six feet apart was not hard to achieve.

Visitor's days: We could not have one! Campers were able to call home in 15 minute time slots. A fabulous day of special activities was set up including inflatable toys and a cotton candy machine!

Meals and the Dining Hall: Social distancing was achieved by building a beautiful deck on the dining hall, which worked very well unless it poured rain. Direction signs in the dining hall for flow of traffic and other food service changes were implemented.

Testing: If someone had symptoms they were tested. This meant isolation until a negative result was received, which also meant staff were taken away from regular duties to look after children in isolation.

Days Off: Staff could not leave the Oconto bubble. Days off were done by cohort, staff went to nearby cottages that had been rented by camp.

Cheers and Songs: Yes! They were done, outside and in cohorts. The hill by the Bung was used as an outdoor Main lodge, we also used the tennis courts for things like Sunday Evening Concert.

Our favourite memory of the summer was on the 2nd last day of August camp. It was the day of the Dive/Synchro/Kayak show. Earlier that morning, the entire Int Section of campers and staff had led an epic flag raising with a carefully choreographed and rehearsed dance to a song called "Teamwork" by Mackenzie Ziegler. It was one of those magical camp mornings. Fast forward through a busy morning of Decathlon etc. and then we all arrive to Main Dock for the Dive/Synchro/Kayak show. As many of you remember, during these shows the campers are brought onto dock in groups of 4 or 5 with one staff member... so the sections are all scattered in various groupings across the floating docks. The Diving and Synchro shows happen beautifully with tons of participation and campers showing off the new skills they have learned. We get to the kayak show which is always full of immense talent. The 1st act of the kayak show happens to also be choreographed to the same song from flag raising that morning- "Teamwork" by Mackenzie Ziegler. We were sitting on the dock beside the diving board watching the kayakers when we suddenly realized that little clusters of Ints all around the docks are also hearing the song and started doing the choreography they had learned for their flag raising. It was a spectacular sight of connectedness, of belonging and of healing. We were grateful for our sunglasses as we teared up behind them... tears of relief that we had reached the end of the summer without COVID-19 entering camp and that the campers and staff were so happy to be together!

What was different about this summer?

This summer was different because we could only stay with the Tads. We would be social distanced or wearing masks with any of the other section campers. We ate social distanced; the tables were moved further apart. When you got up in the mess hall, you would have to wear your mask. Also, you would have to wear your mask in main lodge.

One good thing is that there was this amazing deck that they put on the dining hall which meant we had more eating space and we got to eat outside. I loved the deck.

Did you find your old friends and make some new ones?

I brought one of my best friends from home and I also brought my cousin, and they were both in Tad section with me. And I also made a lot of new friends. It was fun hanging out with the Tads.

What were your favourite activities?

My favourite activities were SPARTs, horseback riding, diving, swimming lessons, windsurfing, and arts and crafts. I liked horseback riding because I never tried it before and I love being around animals and it was just fun riding on something that isn't a car or a bike!

What Zebo or Cabin were you in? *I was in Tads section, Cabin Hilltop 2.*

What were the best evening activities?

The best evening activities I participated in was when we played a game where the counsellors dressed up as animals and hid in Tad section and we had to find them and bring them back to Mountaintop. But, we couldn't touch them, we would have to convince them with our words! And when we got them to Mountaintop, we would get a certain amount of points for each counsellor. My cabin won! We were a very persuasive cabin! I also really loved the last evening program when we did Tad Stampede. We got to run around the camp and play music and shout "TADS!" All the other sections laughed; we did a lot of silly things at camp.

Did you do your activities with your cabin mates or did you pick your own?

Sometimes I'd pick one of my cabin mates to come with me and sometimes I would just be on my own. I liked being on my own because it was a chance to make new friends. Normally, I would just go to SPARTs on my own because I could say "hi" to Kara's dog and paint in peace. It was a good time out.

I liked to go to windsurfing with my cabin mates and friends. We would paddle around on the windsurfing boards and look at all the great views and just play. We had a lot of laughs.

Do you want to go back next summer? YES!! I want to go for a month.

What years have you been at camp?

In 2019, I was a Robin for 5 days in Tads. In 2020, the camp was closed but my mom, aunt, cousin, and I went for a few days for Family Camp. I was in Tads for two weeks in 2021.

What was different about this year?

QC All Camp was slightly different - teams were cohorts instead a mix of all the sections, but still fun. Sunday evening concert on the tennis courts worked well except for the fact that it was pretty buggy. Banquet was the exact same except there were no dance parties - another change was no cheers in the dining hall because singing was considered a high-risk activity.

Despite the fact that there were so many changes and new rules, it was my best summer yet! That's the magic of camp!

CAMP IGNITES LIFE-LONG JOY



Patti attended Oconto from 1967-1972. She was the dear sister of Oconto alumni Joanne Abraham

Farrell (1967-1972), and loving and proud aunt to alumni Stephanie Farrell (1997-2003), Jennifer Farrell (1998) and Patti Farrell (1998-2009).

Patti was born on July 19th, 1958 in Toronto She was an alumni of Branksome Hall, Camp Oconto, and graduated from the University of Western Ontario. The majority of her career was spent with Central Graphics and the Eastwood family. Patti brought so much energy, joy, and dynamism to work every day that rubbed off on employees and customers alike. At every sales meeting they would hand out the Sales Rep of the Month award and it became a running joke as Patti won 9 out of 12 months for years running. It became the "Patti Award".

Patti retired in 2018 and since that time found joy in travelling the world, cooking, her daily walks by the lake, and spending time with her family, friends, and neighbours. She was known for her never negative, always smiling spirit; she was a vivacious personality that could light up any room she entered. Patti's outgoing personality was most apparent in her ability to meet and befriend nearly anyone she



encountered. She was incredibly loving, compassionate, and always willing to help. Patti was loved and cherished by her family and by all those whose lives she was a part of and will be truly missed.

Remembrances

Anne Elizabeth Hamilton Steacy passed away on September 26, 2021. Her obituary notes she was a journalist, a lover of the fine arts, a world traveller, a hockey player, an excellent swimmer and canoeist and a devoted friend to the vast circle of people she met throughout her life. It goes on to say she was radiant, charming and filled so many lives with her warmth and laughter.

Starting at the age of eleven Anne spent her summers at Camp Oconto. Camp was joyous for Anne and it left her with an independent spirit and spontaneous love of nature and comradeship. She remained a camper at Oconto for fourteen years, ending her time as a swimming instructor and drama counsellor. Many would remember her production of Guys and Dolls and Brigadoon. After graduating from Havergal College in 1973 Anne enrolled at Trinity College, University of Toronto where she majored in English. As a legacy to her alma mater Anne was especially proud of her ongoing funding legacy to Trinity College. The courses her initiatives helped financially support included 'Science Writing', several Science streams and her most cherished, a counselling program for Trinity students.

In 2016, Anne was featured in the Oconto Echo after setting up a camping fund to assist girls who would otherwise not have the financial resources, to go to camp. The Anne Steacy Camping Fund (TASCF), administered by Kids In Camp (KIC). At that time, she explained her motivation by observing that, "When a girl has the opportunity to get physically and mentally strong by spending time at camp, the attendant independence and buoyed self-image will inevitably enhance her whole life. At least, that's how it worked for me."




